# MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR: MAY YOU LIVE IN INTERESTING TIMES Bruce Monaghan, MD

Greetings to all members of our Eastern Orthopaedic Association family!

Recently, I participated in the Mid-Winter Meeting of the EOA Board of Directors, a gathering held

every January in the home city of the current EOA president, Kevin Plancher. This meeting is a time to both reflect on recent Association events, and to strategically plan for the coming years.

During this year's meeting, a common expression popped into my mind – "May you live in interesting times." This is a phrase of ambiguous origin, loaded with sardonic intent. While it can be delivered as a well-wished blessing, it is often intended as a curse. Commonly, times of interest are characterized by sudden change under the pressure of large societal disruption. Atlantic City, New Jersey. So many events added up to challenge this core component of the EOA. How were we going to respond?

# **EOEF PRESIDENTIAL GUEST SPEAKER** Bill Walton

The EOA is pleased to welcome William Theodore Walton III as the 2023 EOEF Presidential Guest Speaker. He was born November 5, 1952, is an American television sportscaster and former professional basketball player. He played college basketball for coach John Wooden and the UCLA Bruins, winning three consecutive national college player of the year awards (1972–1974), while leading UCLA to NCAA championships in 1972 and 1973 and an 88-game winning streak. After being selected as the first overall pick in the 1974 NBA draft, Walton led the Portland Trail Blazers to an NBA

championship in 1977, earning the NBA Finals Most Valuable Player Award that season. He won another NBA title with the Boston Celtics in 1986. Walton was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1993. He was named to the NBA's 50th and 75th anniversary teams.

Walton's early career in the National Basketball Association (NBA) was very successful, winning the 1978 NBA Most Valuable Player (MVP) and an NBA championship with the Portland Trail Blazers, for which he was also named Finals MVP. However, his professional career began to be significantly hampered by multiple foot injuries requiring numerous surgeries. Walton sat out the 1978–79 season and was then signed by the San Diego Clippers (now Los Angeles Clippers), for whom he played four injury-plagued seasons. His career was rehabilitated during two seasons with the Boston Celtics at the end of his career. Playing as a backup center behind Robert Parish, Walton earned the NBA Sixth Man of the Year Award in the 1985–86 season, winning his second championship that same season.

After retiring from the NBA, Walton overcame stuttering and embarked on a second career as a sportscaster, working both as a studio analyst and color commentator, mostly for ESPN, with stints for several other networks and teams. He earned an Emmy Award in 1991. Walton is a noted fan of the Grateful Dead, as a self-described "Deadhead," and often mentions them in his broadcasts. He has hosted several podcasts and satellite radio programs featuring the music of the Grateful Dead.



# HOWARD STEEL LECTURER Aron Lee Ralston

The EOA is pleased to have Aron Lee Ralston as the 2023 Howard Steel Lecturer. He was born October 27, 1975, is an American mountaineer, mechanical engineer, and motivational speaker, known for surviving a canyoneering accident by cutting off part of his right arm.

On April 26, 2003, during a solo descent of Bluejohn Canyon in southeastern Utah, he dislodged a boulder, pinning his right wrist to the side of the canyon wall. After five days, he

had to break his forearm in order to amputate it with a dull pocket knife to break free, make his way through the rest of the canyon, rappel down a 65-foot (20 m) drop, and hike 7 miles (11 km) to safety.

The incident is documented in Ralston's autobiography <u>Between a Rock and a Hard Place</u> and is the subject of the 2010 film **127 Hours** where he is portrayed by James Franco.


